- C. Composition, concept (35%)
- D. Technique (35%)
1. Portfolio (50%) - Studio drawings are those that are assigned and completed during class time. They should represent your finest efforts.
 2. Sketchbook (30%) - An essential tool for your personal development! Sketchbooks should be kept neat and orderly and *up-to-date*. Label all assignments carefully. Sketchbooks can be collected at *any time* for grading, so keep it current!
 3. Final Exam (20%) - This will include a drawing exam. The drawing exam will emphasize fundamental drawing skills that have been practiced in class.
