I. CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Course Number: HLTH 1450
Course Title: Therapy Aide
Prerequisite(s): None

Catalog Description: This course provides the student with the skills and knowledge to work as a therapy aide in a variety of rehabilitation settings. Students will learn about the history of the occupational, physical and speech therapy professions; the American Occupational Therapy Association, (AOTA), American Physical Therapy Association (APTA) and American Speech-Language Hearing Association (ASHA). Standards of ethical conduct, customer service, HIPAA and privacy, legal issues, and safe patient handling skills will be taught.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES: *Course will:*

1. Summarize the professions in occupational, physical and speech therapy.
2. Explain the role of the therapy aide or technician in the healthcare team.
3. Summarize the role of the therapy aide or technician in the provision of occupational, physical and speech therapy services
4. Review safe patient handling techniques and body mechanics to assist the Occupational Therapist, Occupational Therapy Assistant, Physical Therapist, Physical Therapist Assistant or Speech Therapist in patient care.
5. Demonstrate the importance of effective communication with patients and all members of the health care team.
6. Introduce students to the Nebraska State Practice Acts for Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy and Speech Therapy.
7. Review the Codes of Ethical Conduct for the Occupational Therapist, Occupational Therapy Assistant, Physical Therapist, Physical Therapist Assistant or Speech Therapist.
8. Explain the importance of standard precautions, HIPAA, confidentiality and privacy in patient care.
9. Prepare the student to work as a therapy aide or technician in a variety of rehabilitation settings.

Note: Unit objectives are located in the learning management system within each unit of study.

5. Demonstrate proper body mechanics when assisting a therapist in the care of a simulated patient.
6. Demonstrate safe patient handling (transfers, bed mobility, positioning, guarding) when assisting a therapist in the care of a simulated patient.
7. Choose the correct infection control technique/standard precautions for patient care.
8. Value individual and cultural differences of patients and members of the healthcare team.
9. Demonstrate professional conduct during interactions with peers and members of the healthcare team.
10. Evaluate how to be a successful member of the healthcare team.
11. Relate the AOTA, APTA and ASHA Code of Ethics to patient care scenarios.
12. Identify the importance of privacy, confidentiality, and observing HIPAA in patient care.
13. Identify the role of the physical therapy aide/technician in different physical therapy settings.
14. Demonstrate proficiency in non-clinical duties.
