I. CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Course Number: HUMS1100
Course Title: Introduction to the Humanities
Prerequisite(s): None
Catalog Description: This is a survey course that focuses on disciplines within the Humanities including art, music, theatre, film, dance, literature, architecture, history, philosophy, and other cultural expressions. Students will examine the unfolding of global humanistic traditions in order to reawaken their sense of wonder and curiosity about the meaning of life. The course gives the students criteria from which to evaluate their own times and situations and in addition, enriches students' historical perspectives. It shows how various disciplines intersect, influence and are influenced by their times.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES: *Course will:*

- A.** Introduce students to the various disciplines and themes of the Humanities in relation to selected major and minor cultural periods.
- B.** Present representative concepts and works from various periods and connect them to the societies that created them.
- C.** Introduce students to significant ideas and important social, geographical, and economic influences of each cultural period in the development of the Humanities.
- D.** Examine the historical and cultural context of major works among the various disciplines within the Humanities.
- E.** Expand students' cultural literacy through the development of discipline related terminology.
- F.** Enhance oral and written communication skills by providing students opportunities to react to experiences of the Humanities in their communities.
