I. CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Course Number: ENGL2140

Course Title: Introduction to Shakespeare

Prerequisite(s): A grade of "C" or higher in ENGL1010 or a grade of "C" or higher in ENGL1054.

Catalog Description: This course provides an introduction to the times and art of William Shakespeare through the study of a selection of major plays. Focus is placed on context of his times and society, themes that speak to a modern audience, and making Shakespeare's language accessible.

Credit Hours: 3.0

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES: *Course will:*

- A. Introduce students to the historical period and culture in which Shakespeare created his plays and sonnets.
- B. Introduce students to the conventions of the comedy, tragedy, and/ history plays.
- C. Provide students with the tools needed to understand the plots and themes of the plays.
- D. Provide students with the tools needed to interpret the lines of the plays.
- E. Provide students with an opportunity to develop their critical thinking and writing skills by providing opportunities to discuss and write about Shakespeare's plays and/or other writings.
- F. Introduce students to various theoretical approaches for interpreting Shakespeare's works (such as historical, psychological, and reader-response).

- 1. Understand and identify the conventions of tragedy and comedy, and/ history plays.

- 4. Analyze and discuss the timeless and universal aspects of Shakespeare's works through class discussion and written assignments.

- 6. Create writing that demonstrates an understanding of MLA guidelines.
- 7. Analyze and create a presentation of a monologue from one of Shakespeare's plays.
