Course Number: PHIL2610/RELS2610

Course Title: Comparative Religions

Prerequisite(s): Eligible for ENGL1010

Catalog Description: This course will offer a cross-cultural introduction to the world's major religious/philosophical traditions or faith systems through a comparison of historical origins, rituals, beliefs, practices, worldviews, original religious texts, and other important sources. Interdisciplinary approach to study of religion and various approaches to the study of religious systems.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES: *Course will:*

- A. Explore the world's diverse religious/philosophical traditions or faith systems.
- B. Survey sacred texts and sources relevant to a variety of religious/philosophical traditions or faith systems.
- C. Examine works of recognized authorities relevant to a variety of religious/philosophical traditions or faith systems.
- D. Critically analyze questions raised by readings and discussion.
- E. Utilize appropriate terminology to discuss and cite source material to support critical opinions about assigned work.
- F. Differentiate religious/philosophical traditions or faith systems as they apply to diverse backgrounds and cultures.
